A wise feedback statement, in a course that is otherwise designed so that many students do not have opportunities to learn and grow their skills, is likely to be ineffective or may backfire. Wise feedback framing statements may also be ineffective if students are hearing conflicting messages coming from different members of the learning team.

b. All members of the learning team (e.g., TAs) understand the core principles of wise feedback		
c. All members of the learning team (e.g., TAs) are equipped with their own wise feedback framing statements
